What can be recycled at home?

We know that recycling can be confusing, but these tips can help you to dispose of and recycle your waste in the most sustainable way.



Rinse, empty, and flatten recyclable items like bottles, keeping lids on containers even if they're made of different materials. Recycling doesn't need to be spotless, small amounts of leftover contents won't prevent items from being recycled.



Paper & card
(Peel off as much tape as possible)



Glass bottles & jars
(With lids on)



Tins & cans

(Wipe off
excess grease)

Ocean Friendly Actions for Your Home

Tick each box as you put these sustainable practices into action.

Save Energy	
	Switch off appliances & lights when not in use
	Keep windows shut with heating on
	Use energy-saving bulbs
	Insulate with window film, draught excluders, radiator reflectors
Shop & Use Wisely	
	Buy unpackaged fruit/veg
	Choose plastic-free toiletries (soap/shampoo bars)
	Use beeswax wraps instead of cling film
	Bring reusable bags, bottles & coffee cups
	Refill cleaning products
	Use cloths instead of paper towels
	Choose recycled toilet/kitchen roll
	Opt for metal razors & reusable period products
	Avoid past fashion by choosing pre-loved clothes
At Home	
	Use cloth nappies
	Wash dishes in a bowl
	Run dishwasher/washing machine only when full
	Take short, seed showers instead of baths

Some items can't go in your home recycle bin, but can still be sustainably disposed of:





Coffee pods: Find drop off points via www.podback.org (Recycling centres, supermarkets, coffee shops).

Milk/Juice cartons: Take to household waste & recycling centres (e.g Chelson Meadows).

Soft plastics (e.g carrier bags/bread bags): Rinse & recycle at large supermarkets.





Toiletry packaging: The Scan2Recycle scheme at Boots provides a way to responsibly recycle many otherwise unrecyclable items in return for boots points!

Medicines & blister packs: Recycle at pharmacies.



Electricals (Including Batteries & Lightbulbs) Recycle at recycling centres or some hardware stores (e.g. B&Q). Some retailers also take back old devices. Find points:

Clothes & textiles: Sell Preloved online, donate to charity shops, or drop at donation banks, or high street shops (e.g. M&S).





Some organisations specialise in hardto recycle items. Visit www.terracycle.com to find out where the free drop-off points are in Plymouth or your local area.



We know that it might seem like a lot to have to take these items to different places - why not set up a "recycling cupboard" where you can store your items until you next visit the supermarket/hardware store etc.
